- Two members were selected to serve as State 4-H Ambassadors in the areas of ▶ Water and Fashion & Interior Design.



Agriculture & Natural Resources:

As Randall County demographics continue to change with increased housing developments, so does the educational needs for our clientele. The Container Gardening Seminar held on April 22, 2024, was a huge success with 66 participants in attendance. Our partners at Panhandle Greenhouse hosted the event after store hours at their store patio area. Topics taught were:

Family and Community Health:

The Homefront Conference:

The Homefront Conference was held April 27, 2024. This event reached over 40 individuals and served clientele interests by educating and exploring the growing field of home sustainability and fostering a connection between agriculture, health and families. The Homefront Conference featured 7 hours of education for the community highlighting the current trends and best practices of homesteading topics such as growing a garden and managing a greenhouse, bee keeping, backyard poultry, utilizing herbs, home remedies, freshly milled wheat, canning, creating a business and more!

Preserving the Harvest Workshop(s):

Three Preserving the Harvest workshops were held that focused on water bath canning, pressure canning, dehydrating and vacuum sealing. The workshops reached a total of 85 participants and included several local entrepreneurs who were utilizing the class as an accredited training. Participants were able to enjoy learning about preservation methods through hands on activities that covered food safety, economics and more related to the science of canning.

Food Safety Certification for Retail Establishments:

A Food Handlers course was conducted for 6 HPRC employees. This certification program allows establishments to maintain positive health code inspections. 92% of participants showed an increase in knowledge of food borne illness risks and preventative behaviors.

Canyon Farmers Market:

 An educational booth at the Canyon Farmers Market showcases local commodities and helps reinforce food safety and helping youth understand food systems. This educational method reached 210 children and reinforced learning concepts through hands on activities and vocational instruction.

Youth Camp Sessions:

• **Reached a total of 197 youth** at 4-H summer camps through educational workshops focused on leadership principles and STEM education that encouraged students to engage their critical thinking skills, collaborate with diverse personalities, practice resilience methodology and active cooperation through building workshops and presentations.

Horticulture:

- Determining the point in a honey bee hive's development when the bees are most efficient at pollinating can help producers best utilize the honey bee's pollination power.
- Horticulture agent, Erin Jones, has been conducting pollination studies in collaboration with researchers in College Station and New Zealand.
- She was invited to speak at the New Zealand Honey Bee Research conference where she won 2nd place with her research project.

Better Living for Texans:

This spring, the BLT program in Randall County has expanded partnerships with local Canyon Independent District schools by consistently providing high-quality programming and resources. The collaboration enabled both parties to focus on empowering youth to make healthy lifestyle choices through combining research and evidenced based nutrition, physical activity and gardening knowledge, with fun and interactive activities.

- Walk N Talk 8-week physical activity program at Lakeview Elementary School with 45 youth participants.
- Learn, Grow, Eat & Go 10-week gardening program at Gene Howe Elementary School with 45 youth participants
- Learn Grow Eat & Go 10-week gardening program at Reeves-Hinger Elementary School with 20 youth participants
- I Can Eat a Rainbow single education nutrition program at Reeves Hinger Elementary School with 106 youth participants
- Delivered 13 food tastings and recipe demos and 16 fresh vegetables and fruit samples
